#### 1883 - August 1st

• Parcel post started in Britain

#### 1923 - August 4th

The BBC began using the 'pips' as a time signal in its broadcasts.

#### 1963 - August 3rd

The Beatles performed at The Cavern Club, for the 292nd, and last time. They received a fee of £300 pounds for the performance.

#### 1963 - August 8th

• The Great Train Robbery, where £2.5+million was stolen, took place near Bletchley.



#### 1993 – August/September issue of the Contact reported:

- Adstock Cricket Club acquired a playing field that was formerly part of Adstock Manor, thanks to lan Tring, former proprietor of the Old Thatched Inn.
- Adstock Ladies Club had their BBQ in August and in September went Roller Skating!
- There was mention of a bike challenge called the 'Padbury Lap', it was to beat John Bruylant's time of 15mins and 6 secs. Has this since been beaten? Would be great to know and by who?
- There was also mention of an Adstock Cookbook and call for more recipes, so that they could publish it for Christmas.

#### 2003 - August 10th

The temperature in Britain exceeded 100° F for the first time when 101.3 °F (38.5 °C) was recorded in the hamlet of Brogdale near Faversham, Kent.

#### 2013 - August/September issue of the Clarion reported:

- A residents Open Evening highlighted a list of over 70 issues in and about the village some of which included:
  - speeding cars through the village, pot holes, flooded roads, request for a community shop and indoor bowling, an adstock website and sending the Clarion by email. Sounds familiar!





## THE ADSTOCK HISTORY CLUB

A History of English Clock Making from 1600 to 1800

A Personal View, History Club talk by local Horologist, Tony
Bates



Horology – the study of the measurement of time – dates back to 1450 BC to Ancient Egypt and is the study of clocks

On June 15<sup>th</sup> Tony Bates entertained the History Club with a fascinating talk on the development of clocks in England between 1600 and 1800.

The first clocks that could be described as truly English Clocks, were **Lantern Clocks**. By 1620 their style was fully established.

These early clocks were made by

blacksmiths, locksmiths and others who were ready to turn their talents to clock making. In 1631 Charles-I granted a Charter of Incorporation to a group of London clock makers, who were petitioning to set up the Worshipful Company of Clock Makers.





Christiaan Huygens, a Dutch mathematician, astronomer and physicist invented and patented the **Pendulum Clock** in 1657, and pendulums soon started to be used in the lantern clocks. Around the same time the English scientist Robert Hooke invented the Anchor Escapement, which, with the pendulum, improved the time keeping of clocks to + or - one minute a day, instead of + or - 15 minutes a day.

Jost Burgi had invented the minute hand in 1577. His invention was part of a clock made for Tycho Brahe, the Danish astronomer who needed an accurate clock for stargazing. However it wasn't until around 1690 that minute hands began to be fitted to lantern and longcase clocks.

The first **Long Case Clocks** appeared around 1660, and were the direct descendent of the Lantern clock. Until about 1690 clock dials were brass with silvered chapter rings, but painted dials were then mass produced around Birmingham and shipped out to clockmakers around

the country. Long Case Clocks continued to be made up to the present day, although the modern versions are mere shadows of what went before.





The Lantern and Longcase Clocks were powered by gravity, but around 1670 **Bracket or Mantle Clocks** appeared, and these were spring driven. This meant that they were more portable.

The Bracket Clock was originally made with a decorative matching bracket to fix to the wall but as decorative mantle shelves appeared as part of fireplaces, with them came the mantle clock. Mantle Clocks are still made today although most are now electric, and not spring driven.

Probably the best known of all English clock makers is **John Harrison**, who was born in the West Riding of Yorkshire in 1693 and followed in his father's profession as a carpenter. He had

an interest in clocks since childhood. Many of his early clocks were made almost entirely from wood, particularly oak and lignum vitae.

Seafaring, at this time, was dangerous, and in 1707 four ships and 1300 sailors were lost in the Scilly Naval Disaster. The British Parliament offered a £20,000 reward to anyone who could devise a way to calculate longitude at sea.

Harrison planned to develop a clock that could tolerate fluctuations in temperature and air pressure, and could keep exact time for a very long time. It took five years to develop his first Sea Clock – H1. This was given its first sea trial on a route to Portugal, and it accurately predicted longitude but this was not enough for the Parliamentary prize. A transatlantic voyage would be necessary, and Parliament asked him to continue the work.

Harrison produced a second clock, H2, but this was not a success. Testing was held up by external events, like the War of the Spanish Succession, and by the time it was safe to carry out sea trials, Harrison realised that there was a serious fault in the design and it was abandoned.

The next 17 years was spent working on H3, which was more complex than its predecessors, but success eluded Harrison, and around 1750 he abandoned his Sea Clock and started working on a smaller Sea Watch. This Marine Watch, M4, took 6 years to build and on its first trial to Jamaica, it proved very accurate. To convince Parliament Harrison had to complete other trials, which were successful. He was eventually awarded £8,750, although he was, by then 80 years old. The full prize was never awarded to anyone!

#### **History Club Outing to Milton Keynes Museum**

On July 19<sup>th</sup> we ventured out of the village and visited Milton Keynes Museum. To those who have not been, it is well worth a visit. The farmhouse, built in 1847, has a variety of rooms and displays which are fascinating – and

there is something to interest everyone. We particularly enjoyed the school room, the communication room with switchboards and novelty phones, the hall of transport, and the street of shops.

There is so much to see, and during our visit there were many volunteers who were happy to talk about the exhibits. Entry tickets are also valid for twelve months and many of us are planning to revisit in September for the 1940's weekend.

## June 2023 Science Club Talk – "The End is Nigh"

#### AI, CBDC's and Social Media

About a year ago I was trawling through the Internet searching for interesting topics for the Science Club to take a look at, and I came across a YouTube video by some boffin about a computer program called ChatGPT. At the time it had just been released and was gaining interest from various quarters but as yet had not hit the headlines. ChatGPT stands for – Chat Generative Pre-Trained Transformer – and is an Artificial Intelligence or AI chatbot developed by OpenAI. A "chatbot" is a program designed to simulate conversation with human users, especially over the Internet.

After watching this amazing video I thought here is something that is going to be big. Unless you've been hiding under a rock or been on an expedition to some far off jungle, with no means of communication, you cannot have failed to be aware of the constant news items about ChatGPT3, now 4, and how AI is going to take over the world and enslave humanity.

My talk back, in June, was loosely based on this idea but also tried to knit together other technologies that seem to be closely linked to this theme. I called it "The End is Nigh".

Did you know that 50% of AI researches believe that there's a 10% or greater chance of humans going extinct from our inability to control AI. I discussed what is called the Three Rules of Technology, these are –

I. When you invent a new technology, you uncover a new class of responsibilities

2. If the tech confers power, it starts a race

3. If you do not coordinate, the race ends in tragedy

I went on to give examples of where these rules have come to pass, the Atom Bomb being a good example.

I came to the conclusion that there are three technologies currently converging which may lead to humanities Woes. The first of these is the development of Artificial Intelligence or AI. It comes in three flavours:

- 1) Artificial Narrow Intelligence ANI
- 2) Artificial General Intelligence AGI
- 3) Artificial Super Intelligence ASI

Currently we are at the first of these. Programs like ChatGPT3/4, Meta's Llama2 and many others are very capable at conversing with humans and even able to seemingly create some original essays, music and lyrics also "fake" images and videos. These capabilities are becoming a big headache for educators, news and security services as fake images and videos have already been produced and shared over the Internet for both good and ill. Topically many actors in both the UK and the US are, as I write, striking due to worries not only about pay but also about the ability of AI to create fake actors. However, chatbots are still a ways off from being an AGI.

An AGI is considered to have the same mental abilities as a human and possibly consciousness. When artificial intelligence gains the ability to outperform humans intellectually at every level, then we have reached ASI and this could pose an existential threat to all humanity. But a lot can happen between now and then, so don't give up hope just yet.

The second technology which peaked my interest is that of CBDC's or Central Bank Digital Currencies. CBDC's are based on "Block Chain" digital currency technology such as Bitcoin but have the added feature of being programmable. The idea is that we eventually become a cashless society, "paper" money will no long be needed — Great you think, there will no longer be the threat of being physically robbed, security of your money will be paramount with double, treble or whatever factor authentication and/or biometrics. No chance of anybody hacking into your bank account to relieve you of your hard earned dosh. Transactions will be instantaneous; paying for stuff and other financial processes will be much easier. However did I mention CBDC's are programmable? CBDC's is digital money created and distributed by the government and their preferred bank who will then have total knowledge and control of every single dime/penny that you think is yours. CBDC's can be used as a means of social engineering allowing governments to reward or punish you depending on your choices. If you decide to buy a gas guzzling car, you may find that suddenly you carbon footprint tax has increased or your credit rating takes a dip. Buy meat instead of "healthy" vegan stuff and the same thing could happen. This is already happening in China.

The last technology that is already having an effect on people are "Algorithms" and specifically those running on your computer, tablet and mobiles. Algorithms have been around for as long as humans have been around, but have now come into their own due to the power of the computer and the Internet. Google, Facebook, TikTok, Twitter or should that now be "X" and all other social media apps. use algorithms too, not only to DRIVE users to their sites but to find out everything possible about them, their height, weight, inside leg measurement, food preferences; TV, film and music they like, where they shop, what they buy, the list goes on, Oh and earning and bank details. You are an open book. And as we have only recently found out banks, it seems, are actively looking at the social media posts of their customers to decide if they should be encouraged to stay or leave their bank as Nigel Farage has recently found to his cost. Businesses have also been doing this for some time by trawling through the social media of job applicants.

My worry is that if you put these three strands of technology together, not only are we potentially going to be surpassed by Al but governments and organisations are gaining the knowledge and ability to control every aspect of our lives through the use of CBDC's and the algorithms powering social media.


The one ray of light in all this is that now we know what's going on, we have a chance of affecting the way these technologies are developed and used. It doesn't have to end in Doom and Gloom.



#### Strange Sally Diamond by Liz Nugent

Sally Diamond cannot understand why what she did was so strange. She was only doing what her father told her to do, to put him out with the rubbish when he died. Now Sally is the centre of attention, not only from the media and the police, but also a sinister voice from a past she cannot remember. As she begins to discover the horrors of her childhood, Sally steps into the world for the first time, making new friends and taking big decisions, and learning that people don't always mean what they say.

This is a story of abuse and it is confronted head on by the author. For some of us this meant not wanting to read further when the depth of the abuse was revealed, all the while recognising how very well written this book is. As Sally's story is revealed there are some darkly comic moments including telling the vicar she doesn't go to church, "as it is so boring". Sally always tells it as it is but the people around her slowly help her to integrate into the community. The author tricks the reader to hope that her journey will be redemptive but the arc of the



story takes us to a different point where the past will not let go. The book is full of emotion and cruelty even from those who probably mean well and as Liz Nugent peels back layers within the story the reader is ambushed by mounting horrors; none are gratuitous, all tell the story of how one man's abuse lives on through the generations. For me, the best book we have read this year.

How to Kill Men - and get away with it by Katy Brent

He was following me. That guy from the nightclub who wouldn't leave me alone. I hadn't intended to kill him of course. That's where my addiction started...I've got a taste for revenge and quite frankly, I'm killing it.

Kitty Collins, a rich, A-list, independent 'influencer' delivers her own class of revenge on those who would treat her or her Chelsea friends bad. She does it with panache, wit and a skill that any hit-person would admire.

Generally enjoyed as a good beach read. Highly improbable but if you liked Dexter you'll enjoy this.
