

Padbury – Ref 22/03695/AOP

Padbury have received and outline planning application for up to 81 dwellings. This is a huge potential development Adstock side of Padbury. Adstock Parish Council have attended a meeting in Padbury and have offered out support by objecting to this planning. Please see further details below and add your objections to the website.

Representatives from Adstock Parish Council attended a meeting on Tuesday evening, 22nd November, organized by Padbury Parish Council concerning an Outline Planning Application for 81 houses on land north of the A413, extending the boundary of Padbury Village towards Adstock.

It is always sad to see Greenfield land disappearing under development but some local tradespeople may be pleased to see additional potential customers.

Three issues that could potentially affect Adstock are TRAFFIC, FLOOD RISK and SCHOOL PLACES

- 1. Increase in traffic at the already tricky junction onto the A413. Of the 81 proposed houses, 57 are 3 bed or larger. The Transport Report suggests there would be 40 exits from the estate in the morning peak. The calculations in Keith's document posted on the planning portal (see below) suggest significantly more and he questions whether or not the Report's comparison of Padbury with other selected sites compares like with like.
- 2. Increased impermeable surface at the site will result in increased runoff of rainwater. It appears from the Ordnance Survey map that runoff water from the proposed site drains into a stream that for part of its length points directly at Adstock. Before it reaches our village the stream turns south to the A413 and flows under the junction at the Adstock turn on the A413 which as we all know floods regularly. The FRA & Drainage Report details steps, including a detention pond with controlled exit through a valve, to mimic a Greenfield site.
- 3. Many Adstock children attend Padbury Church of England School. Places are now difficult for those not living in Padbury. 81 new homes will result in more pressure on the School and the likelihood of no places for Adstock Children

What you need to do:

On Buckinghamshire Council website go to 'view and comment on a Planning Application', select 'Aylesbury Vale' and type in the ref. no. 22/03695/AOP at bottom of page.

- 1. Study the application documents, including Transport Statement and FRA & Drainage report. Read Keith's comments on these reports on the planning portal (25th November 'Dr Keith Wallace'). Make up your own mind.
- 2. If your comment exceeds 6000 characters or includes photos then you cannot use the 'make a comment' online form. So e-mail your comments to devcontrol.av@buckinghamshire.gov.uk and ask them to upload your comments. You will need to preface your e-mail with the personal details that you would have provided if you had used the 'make a comment' online form. You can ask to have phone no. and e-mail address redacted.
- 3. Retain a personal copy. Once decision is made, public comments are deleted.
- 4. Ordnance Survey maps are copyright & cannot be reproduced without prior written permission, contact details are on the maps. The map Keith refers to in his comments is Explorer 192, 1:25000 scale.
- 5. If you have any photos of crashes or flooding at the Adstock turn in recent years then consider including them.
- 6. Get your comments in as soon as possible. Do not leave it to the run up to Christmas or after.

The December meeting was our Christmas dinner at The Old Thatched Inn. As always, it was a fun, conversation filled evening but with considerably less discussion than normal about our November book choice – The Empire by Micheal Ball – which, I must confess, I have still to read!!!



Unlike our December book – Still Life by Sarah Winman – which I have finished and thoroughly enjoyed. I invariably gravitate to thrillers and crime novels and one of the great appeals of any bookclub is that it broadens the range of books you read. Still Life was one such book.

Opening in Tuscany in 1944 Tuscany, 1944, as Allied troops advance and bombs fall around deserted villages, a young English soldier, Ulysses Temper, finds himself in the wine cellar of a deserted villa. There, he has a chance encounter with Evelyn Skinner, a middle-aged art historian who has come to Italy to salvage paintings from the ruins and recall long-forgotten memories of her own youth. In each other, Ulysses and Evelyn find a kindred spirit amongst the rubble of war-torn Italy, and set off on a course of events that will shape Ulysses's life for the next four decades.

As Ulysses returns home to London, re-immersing himself in his crew at The Stoat and Parrot -- a motley mix of pub crawlers and eccentrics -- he carries his time in Italy with him. And when an unexpected inheritance brings him back to where it all began, Ulysses knows better than to tempt fate, and returns to the Tuscan hills.

The book is beautifully written with tenderness, bursts of humour and light, and is an uplifting portrait of unforgettable characters who come together to make a family.

I decided to start the year with a slightly delayed celebration. The Adstock Science Club began life in November 2010 with a talk given by Mr Michael Heason, some of you may know as Muscles Mike. He also ran the Forces Fitness Farm exercise club every Monday. His talk was "The Rifle" and gave us a rundown of the history and operation of the modern rifle.

As we were not able to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the Science Club in 2020 due to Covid, which also was around in 2021 and last year, I thought we should at least do this now as things seem to be relaxing a bit. So with some "fizzy" we sang Happy Birthday to the Science Club, all 18 of us.

I went over some of our previous talks and outings and explained, especially to those who weren't around at the beginning, why I started the club and some of the functions I hoped it would perform in Adstock. For instance, I hoped to increase people's understanding of science and the role it plays in our lives and how important it is when trying to understand decisions made by companies, authorities, governments and other organisations which may directly affect us but because we don't understand what they're talking about, we can't ask appropriate questions.

It is also nice to have a group of people around you that you can relate to and socialise with.

Over the twelve years we've been around we have had 76 talks, half of these were presented by some of the top scientists and people in their fields. The other half were presented by members of our club who took the time and effort to research interesting subjects and then get up and tell everyone else about what they had found out.

One of my main aims in my presentation was to try and motivate more of the members to take a fuller part in the operation and running of the club. I would really like to have them come up with lots of new ideas for talks, speakers and places to visit.

Anyway if anyone is interested, our next talk will be on Thursday 23rd February at 7:30pm at 1 Greenfields and will be presented by my namesake Mr Marius Perkins, who was a material scientist. His talk "The History of the World in Seven Materials" is about how humans are often distinguished from other animals as tool users and makers. The materials they used to make these tools are themselves an indicator of the progress of Human society.

If you fancy coming along give me a call. As there is limited space available I will only be able to fit maybe 3 or 4 extra people. So first come first served. Hope you all have a great 2023.

THE ADSTOCK HISTORY CLUB

After 2 months when the speakers had to cancel at the last minute due to illness, we entered the New Year with some trepidation, but we need not have worried. Mr Rob Beadel, an Adstockian, came over and gave the History Club members a fascinating talk on The Siege of Melos in 416 BC.

In Ancient Greece, the two most powerful city-states were Athens and Sparta. Athens had the superior navy and controlled nearly all the islands in the Aegean Sea, whilst Sparta had a very well trained military and soldiers. In 431 BC a war broke out between the two cities - a war based on trade routes, rivalries, and tributes paid by smaller dependent states. This conflict, the Peloponnesian War, essentially was a 28-year period of on and off civil war among Greek city-states.

Melos, an island in the Aegean Sea roughly 68 miles east of mainland Greece, had several ties to Sparta but was neutral during the war.

In the summer of 416 BC, during a truce with Sparta, Athens sent an army of at least 3,400 men to conquer Melos. After setting up camp on the island, they sent emissaries to negotiate with the rulers of Melos, and these emissaries demanded that the Melians surrender and pay tribute to Athens or face annihilation.

The Classical Athenian historian Thucydides wrote a dramatization of the negotiations before the siege entitled The Melian Dialogue. In this, the Athenians offered no moral justification for their invasion, but instead bluntly told the Melians that they needed Melos for its own ends and that the only thing Melians stood to gain in submitting without a fight was self-preservation.

The Melians refused to surrender and the Athenians laid siege to the city. Eventually Melos surrendered, and the Athenians executed all the adult men, and sold the women and children into slavery.

Although I have walked other people's dogs since the age of 10, as a new puppy owner there was lots to learn. Do I use a crate? How to toilet train.

Advice was offered, and websites read. Usually in the middle of the night when puppy would not settle! However, one of our best new puppy gifts was a pair of bells on a ribbon, to help with puppy toilet training. I thought, that won't last long and most likely end up in the garden with all the other balls and toys. The idea is to hang them on a door to the garden or outside area, so that whenever puppy is let outside you ring the bell, eventually they learn to nudge the bell with their nose when they want to go out. Amazingly it really worked. It didn't take Molly long to realise that a nudge on the bell and she was allowed outside. To this day she still stands by the same door even though there are no bells.



Our favourite walks

These are in the local Thornborough and Coombs Woods. I suspect most villagers know of this area. Managed by the Woodland Trust it offers four great woodland area's fully enclosed and separated from main roads and farmland by clear boundaries. With signposted walking routes through or around the wooded areas and large open spaces it is unusually safe, particularly for dogs and children. Stunning to walk through in the summer when the trees and plants are at their best. Winter offers some less muddy woodland walking routes, which are not normally passable in the dense summer growth.



Established in 2015 it preserves and enhances the 168 acres of green space within Thornborough and Adstock parish, and is known as 'Thornborough Community Woodlands and Coombs Quarry'. As a charity they rely on local help, donations and funding to manage the woods, which I must say always look well maintained. The woods can be found on the Adstock Road leading to Coombs.
