The Summer is looming over the horizon and looking to get even warmer if the weather forecast is to be believed. On that note of Summer it got me thinking about the Summer Solstice and pagan festivals.

The word solstice literally means "sun standing still", derived from combining the Latin words sol for "sun" and sistere for "To Stand Still". When the Northern or Southern Hemisphere is most tilted towards the sun, it experiences the summer solstice; when it is most tilted away, it experiences the [winter solstice](#).

The summer solstice and subsequent longest day of the year are celebrated by many cultures around the world with numerous traditions, holidays and festivals. From sunrise gatherings to midsummer festivals, on either 20th or 21st June.

Humans have been observing the sun's position in the sky for thousands of years, and monuments such as Stonehenge in England, [Karnak](#) in Egypt, and [Chankillo](#) in Peru stand as a testament to our fascination with our nearest star. Solstices have also influenced many traditions and celebrations around the world.

At Stonehenge, the sun rises behind the ancient entrance to a stone circle and "the sunlight is channeled into the center of the monument". Researchers believe that solstices have been celebrated at Stonehenge for thousands of years and is particularly important to pagans and druids.

Closer to home in our neighbouring city of Milton Keynes a widely believed [urban myth](#) about the grid system being aligned to the midsummer sunrise, is not true. *Midsummer sunrise is actually somewhere to the east – not actually on the alignment of Midsummer Boulevard: But it was a good urban myth to lay down.*

Whatever you do to celebrate Summer, enjoy and mind the sunburn!

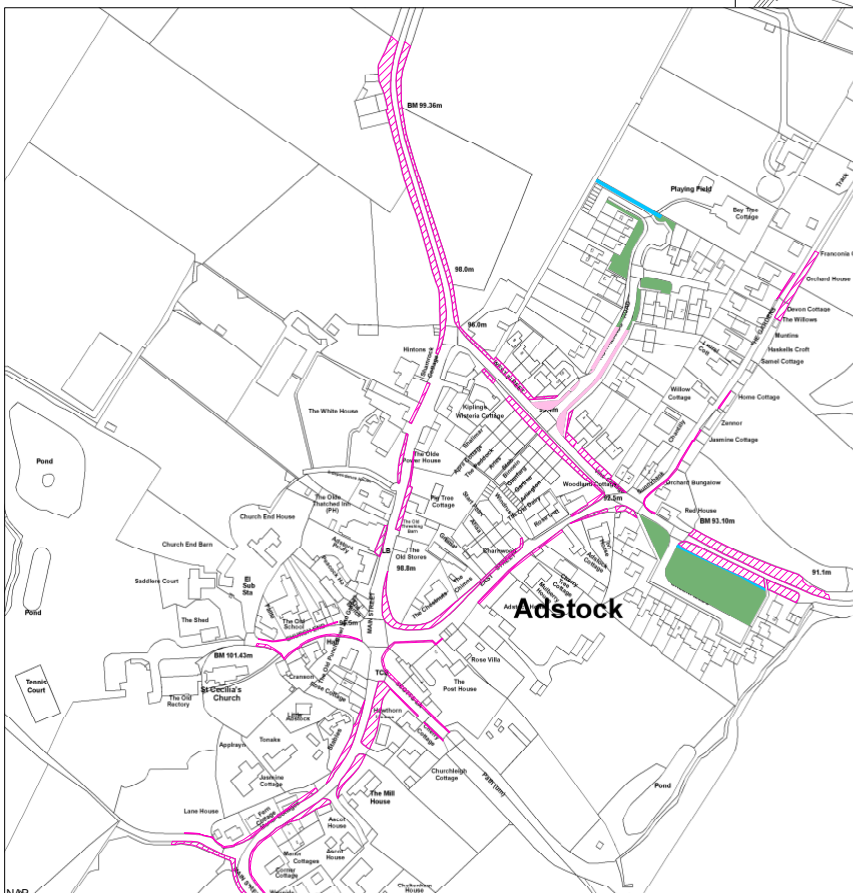
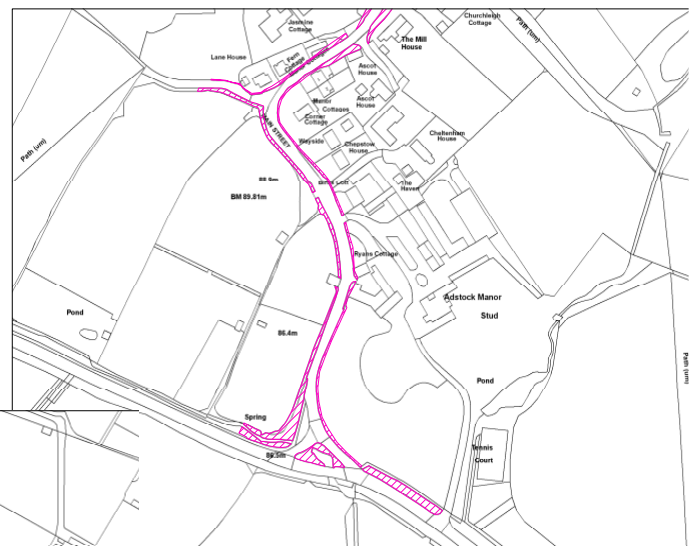

Thank you for your support, prayers, kind thoughts and offers of help since I was taken ill just before Easter. Ken and I very much appreciate them. CLUB NEWS



TASC Talk “Crazy Interstellar Rockets” for May 2023

Speaker, Dr Julian Onions

Dr Onions is an astronomer at Nottingham University and presented the Adstock Science Club with a talk that gave us a basic grounding in rocket science but also took a look at the possible future of space travel.

What sort of rockets or spaceships could we use to go to distant stars? He explored some of the crazier designs that have been proposed over the years, most of which have some possibility of working.



With our current technology it would take around 9 months to reach Mars, the furthest we have managed to go so far into space are with the Voyager, Pioneer and New Horizon probes. The chart below shows approximate distances they have travelled so far.

By the way, an AU or Astronomical Unit, is the distance between the Earth and the Sun i.e. 93 million miles.

So the furthest we have managed to travel into space is around 152 AUs, however this is not very far as the nearest star is 27,000 AU or 0.05% to the

nearest star. Voyager 1 will pass one of our nearest stars, Gliese 445, which is 1.7 Light Years away, in about 40,000 years, not really the time one would want to take to get somewhere!

Julian gave us a brief overview of some of the maths needed to explain and compare the lifting capabilities between different types of rocket engines along with an explanation of how Newton's 3rd Law of motion is relevant. Newton's 3rd Law states that "every action has an equal and opposite reaction", basically the more rocket exhaust is pushed out the back, the more the rocket moves forward.

So the higher or further away from Earth you want to get, into earth orbit, the Moon or Mars etc. the more thrust and therefore the more fuel you will need. I won't go into the detailed maths here except to say that the way scientists measure the thrust of rocket is by using a thing called "Specific Impulse" or SI. Here is a link to Wikipedia if you want to know more - [Specific impulse - Wikipedia](#).

He explained how different propellants, starting with gun powder, have differing SIs. The larger the SI the more efficient the rocket engine is. Gun powder has a SI of 80; the solid rocket boosters of the space shuttle has a SI of 242 and the Saturn V, the rocket used to launch the first men to the Moon has a max SI of 304.

He then outlined various different types of rocket engines from Solid and liquid fuel rockets to Ion Drives, Nuclear engines. The technology of these rockets is pretty straight forward but some of the engines discussed would be hazardous to anything and anyone in the vicinity. He then went on to describe some of the more exotic types of rocket engines that have been proposed including a version of Star Trek's Warp Drive

THE ADSTOCK HISTORY CLUB

Villagers may have heard groans and cheers echoing up and down East Street on 26th April, when the Adstock History Club annual quiz took place. As usual Cliff supplied a wide variety of history – related questions, which made competitors feel smug (because they knew the answers), irritated (because they knew they knew the answer, but couldn't remember it) or totally bewildered (like me). Sadly I was not in the winning team, but Claire, Debbie, Jill, Rob and Tony went happily home, clutching their prize bottles of wine.

May was a much less stressful event – Steve Dimmer came to Adstock to give a talk about 'The Life and Crimes of Agatha Christie'

Agatha Mary Clarissa Miller was born in September 1890, in Torquay in Devon, and was largely home-schooled. Her mother Clara, who was an excellent story teller, did not want her to learn to read until she was 8, but Agatha, bored, and the only child at home, taught herself to read by the age of 5. By the age of 18, Agatha was amusing herself by writing short stories



The Mysterious Affair at Styles, featuring Hercules Poirot was written partly in response to a bet from her sister Madge that she could not write a good detective story, and partly to relieve the monotony of her work in the dispensary at the hospital. After several rejections, the book was accepted for publication by John Lane of Bodley Head publishers, who contracted Agatha to produce 5 more books.

Agatha went on to write 66 detective novels, and 14 short story collections, as well as the world's longest –running play – The Mousetrap. Her books have sold over a billion copies in the English language, and a billion copies in translation.

In 1912, she met Archibald Christie, and they married in 1914. In 1922 they travelled across the then British Empire, and on their return to England settled in a house they named Styles in the suburbs of London. Sadly Agatha's mother died in 1926, and Archie fell in love with a fellow golfer and friend of the family, Nancy Neale. He asked Agatha for a divorce.

One night in December Agatha and Archie argued and late that evening she disappeared from her home in Sunningdale. Despite a £100 reward being offered, and a search involving more than a thousand police officers, 15,000 volunteers and several aeroplanes searching the rural landscape, she was not found for 10 days.

She was discovered in a hotel in Harrogate, 185 miles from her home in Surrey, registered as Mrs Tessa Neale.

Steve showed several clips from films featuring Hercules Poirot and Miss Marple, and reminded us of the different actors that have appeared on stage and screen as the two characters. He also displayed the many covers of the books that the majority of us had enjoyed reading in the past.



We were all surprised to learn the answers to some of the questions Steve posed. For instance:

- *What was the name of Hercules Poirot's brother?*
- *Who appeared as Miss Marple on television in 1956?*

And who was the actor who has been in every performance of The Mousetrap on stage? Our next History Club meeting is on 21st June, when Tony Bates will be giving us a talk. Visitors are always welcome to attend our meetings.

The Betrayals - Bridget Collins

There were three approaches to this choice:

- a) sorry, no, I'll read the other choice
- b) I'll give it a go: i.e., read the regulation 100 pages
- c) I'm being pulled along by the sorry and want to get to the end even though it is like wading through treacle.

The novel takes place in Montverre, an elite academy, where the best and brightest men are trained to play the grand jeu: an arcane glass bead game that includes music, art, maths, poetry and philosophy. Léo Martin, once a student there, left following a violent tragedy, returns in disgrace. He was Minister of Culture in a reimagined 1940's fascist state where Christians are persecuted, and dissidents disappeared.

Montverre has changed, even allowing a woman, Claire Dryden, to serve in the grand jeu's highest office of Magister Ludi. Both Léo and Claire have built their lives on lies. And as the legendary Midsummer Game, the climax of the year, draws closer, all is revealed. Those who got to the end did enjoy the narrative and even uncovered the mystery of The Rat hiding in the dark alcoves of this old building.

Those who gave up trying to wade through the book may agree with the Guardian reviewer who found it "overblown and obtruse". Collins has tried to write a book that, while it tells a story, is actually playing a game with and against the reader. It is full of references to chess moves by Philidor, a tune called "The Seven Bridges of Königsberg" [actually one for science club as it is a mathematical problem] and other complexities and deliberate ambiguities woven to the plot. All this makes it an unclear read especially when one of her themes is misogyny. She sets her story in the 1940s but what's she saying? It would have been more potent if the glass bead game played on the glass mountain had been some sort of magical incantation against the fascists. Are we supposed to fight for Claire to become Magistra Ludi instead of accepting a male title?

Her cleverness falls short of her ambition. She could have invented a new world but she has taken Hermann Hesse's novel "The Glass Bead Game" 1943 and reverse engineered it. His was written under a fascist regime but set in the 23th Century as a parable, the story of Joseph Knecht, who gets into an elite school where he plays the Grand Jeu and beats all comers to become Magister Ludi and then betrays that totalitarian regime to leave and become a tutor, taking his knowledge out into the world instead of using it to play a pointless game. Hesse also plays with his readers; knecht means servant and the circularity of this densely philosophical novel shows that this is what he chooses to become, and his contemporary readers would have understood his anti-fascist references. Most of Hitler's ministers and generals came from Germany's elite schools and universities and WW2 was their Grand Jeu.

If I were Magistra Ludi, it would get a *C-* *must try harder* from me.

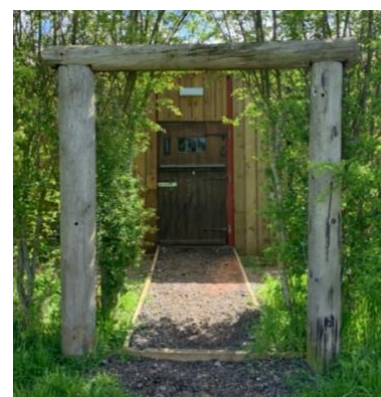

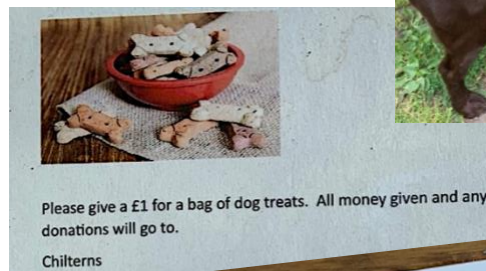
