Some Amazing Christmas Facts

Two of Santa's reindeer originally had different names.



Account of a Visit from Saint Nicholas was a poem first published anonymously in 1823, and later credited to Clement Clarke Moore. The poem is more commonly known as The Night before Christams, or 'Twas the Night Before Christmas'.

In the 1823 poem, *the world was* introduced to Santa's reindeer, two of the whom had slightly different names. Donner and Blitzen were called Dunder and Blixem, which is a Dutch way to refer to "thunder and lightning."

Artificial Christmas trees were once made with goose feathers.



These days, artificial Christmas trees are made of materials that are meant to mimic real evergreens and last for as long as possible. But when fake Christmas trees were first displayed in Germany around 1865, they were made of goose feathers that were dyed green.

"Jingle Bells" was the first song played in space.



The crew of NASA's *Gemini 6A* space flight got into the Christmas spirit *and* made history when they played "Jingle Bells" on December 16, 1965, earning the jolly jingle the Guinness World Record for being the first song ever played in space.

In Ukraine, spiders are considered symbols of good luck at Christmas



The Legend of the Christmas spider tells how a poor but hardworking widow once lived in a small hut with her children. One summer day, a pine cone fell on the earthen floor of the hut and took root. The widow's children cared for the tree, excited at the prospect of having a Christmas tree by winter. The tree grew, but when Christmas Eve arrived, they could not afford to decorate it. The children sadly went to bed and fell asleep. Early the next morning, they woke up and saw the tree covered with cobwebs. When they

opened the windows, the first rays of sunlight touched the webs and turned them into gold and silver. The widow and her children were overjoyed. From then on, they never lived in poverty again.

Tinsel was once made of real silver.



In the early 17th century in Nuremberg, Germany, people "used thin strands of real silver in their trees to reflect candlelight, as they used to put real candles in their trees.

Since silver was expensive, being able to use tinsel in your tree was something of a status symbol.



Thomas Edison and his business partner invented Christmas lights.



Thomas Edison has gone down in history as one of America's greatest inventors. As well as the light bulb, phonograph, and the movie camera, he is also partly responsible, along with his friend Edward H. Johnson, for inventing Christmas lights? Edison created the first strand of electric lights in 1880, and hung strands of electric lights outside his laboratory in Menlo Park, New Jersey, during Christmastime. In 1882, Edward Johnson, his partner at Edison Illumination Company, wrapped a strand of hand-wired red, white, and blue bulbs around a Christmas tree.

The first Christmas card ever sent is worth £20,000.



On Nov. 24, 2001, a Christmas card was sold at auction in Devizes, Wiltshire, for £20,000, making it the most valuable Christmas card in the world. It was sent by Sir Henry Cole, a Bath-born businessman, to his grandmother in 1843 and is hand-coloured by the London illustrator John Calcott Horsley." The lithographed illustration depicts a multigenerational family enjoying a Christmas party and there are only 12 of the original 1,000 cards still in existence.

Padbury - Ref 22/03695/AOP

Padbury have received and outline planning application for up to 81 dwellings. This is a huge potential development Adstock side of Padbury. Adstock Parish Council have attended a meeting in Padbury and have offered out support by objecting to this planning.

Please see further details below and add your objections to the website.

Representatives from Adstock Parish Council attended a meeting on Tuesday evening, 22nd November, organized by Padbury Parish Council concerning an Outline Planning Application for 81 houses on land north of the A413, extending the boundary of Padbury Village towards Adstock. It is always sad to see greenfield land disappearing under development but some local tradespeople may be pleased to see additional potential customers.

Two issues that could potentially affect Adstock are TRAFFIC and FLOOD RISK.

- 1. Increase in traffic at the already tricky junction onto the A413. Of the 81 proposed houses, 57 are 3 bed or larger. The Transport Report suggests there would be 40 exits from the estate in the morning peak. The calculations in Keith's document posted on the planning portal (see below) suggest significantly more and he questions whether or not the Report's comparison of Padbury with other selected sites compares like with like.
- 2. Increased impermeable surface at the site will result in increased runoff of rainwater. It appears from the Ordnance Survey map that runoff water from the proposed site drains into a stream that for part of its length points directly at Adstock. Before it reaches our village the stream turns south to the A413 and flows under the junction at the Adstock turn on the A413 which as we all know floods regularly. The FRA & Drainage Report details steps, including a detention pond with controlled exit through a valve, to mimic a greenfield site.

What you need to do:

- 1. On Buckinghamshire Council website go to 'view and comment on a Planning Application', select 'Aylesbury Vale' and type in the ref. no. 22/03695/AOP at bottom of page.
- 2. Study the application documents, including Transport Statement and FRA & Drainage report. Read Keith's comments on these reports on the planning portal (25th November 'Dr Keith Wallace'). Make up your own mind.
- 3. If your comment exceeds 6000 characters or includes photos then you cannot use the 'make a comment' online form. So e-mail your comments to devcontrol.av@buckinghamshire.gov.uk
 - and ask them to upload your comments. You will need to preface your e-mail with the personal details that you would have provided if you had used the 'make a comment' online form. You can ask to have phone no. and e-mail address redacted.
- 4. Retain a personal copy. Once decision is made, public comments are deleted.
- 5. Ordnance Survey maps are copyright & cannot be reproduced without prior written permission, contact details are on the maps. The map Keith refers to in his comments is Explorer 192, 1:25000 scale.
- 6. If you have any photos of crashes or flooding at the Adstock turn in recent years then consider including them.
- 7. Get your comments in as soon as possible. Do not leave it to the run up to Christmas or after




A talk at the Adstock Science Club on 17th November, 2022


Our November Science Club meeting was on the subject of Geology and Plate Tectonics and was presented by one of our members, Mr Mike Turner. The talk was titled "Did the Earth Move for You".

His interest in this field was sparked in the early 60's by an enthusiastic and charismatic teacher and following obtaining his BSc and Masters he worked as a Geotechnical Engineer for Terresearch, a subsidiary of Taylor Woodrow.

His talk outlined the beginnings of Geological Science with its roots in the 1700's and a man, James Hutton (1726 to 1797), who presented his "Theory of the Earth" at the Edinburgh Royal Society and was considered to be the founder of modern geology. During the talk a number of other significant people were mentioned along with their theories and discoveries.



One important discovery was made in 1909 by Andrija Mohorovicic and this was named the Mohorovicic Discontinuity (or Moho), the interface between the earth's crust and its mantle. One important fact about this is that earth quake waves are able to pass more quickly through the denser mantle then through the crust. Seismologist are able to use these vibration differences to work out what the composition of the material below the crust is made of and its distribution.




Mike also explained how some extreme geological structures are created by the folding of the earth's crust. These are called "Recumbent Folds".

Did you know that between 1928 and 1930 the drinks manufacturer Carlsberg funded a


circumnavigation of the World's oceans where a 1000 metre high ridge was discovered sticking out from the floor of the Indian Ocean? This came to be known as the "Carlsberg Ridge" (Not just any Ridge) – get it! And in 1962 the research ship HMS Owen was sent to the Indian Ocean to further investigate the Carlsberg Ridge. Data collected from this survey by Drummond Matthews, from Cambridge University, was analysed by his research student Frederic Vine on one of the earliest mainframe computers at the University, the Electronic Delay Storage Automatic Calculator (EDSAC2).

This discovery later played a central role in one of the greatest scientific revolutions of the 20th century. What they found was that the strata of the ocean floor was created by volcanic eruptions and then relocated by a sort of "conveyor belt" system of moving lava which could be identified by taking readings of the changing polarity of the Earth's magnetic field recorded within the structure of the hardening crust.

This process would build up a sort of magnetic bar code on the undersea crust which could be read by ship borne magnetometers. All sorts of useful information could be obtained from these "magnetic stripes".



The diagram on the left attempts to show how this process occurs. Continental drift is the process by which the Earth's continental plates have drifted apart over geologic time relative to each other and in part can be explained by this process. There are seven major plates including the African, Antarctic, Eurasian, North American, South American, India-Australian, and the Pacific plates. Some of the minor plates include the Arabian, Caribbean, Nazca, and Scotia plates. See below diagram


