


Marian Mason - Remembered by Sandra Rooney & Jennifer Stuart

Her late husband had been in the RAF where they lived in Singapore, Bahrain & Ballykelly leading an expat life. When he left the RAF they bought a pub in the Chiltern Hills which they ran until they moved to Herefordshire.

Apart from her children and grandchildren she had several other loves, one was her lifelong passion for horses and had owned a number in the past which she rode in equestrian events. Her second love was her two dogs who sadly died in the last couple of years and lastly her Saab 93 Aero was one of her most treasured possessions which she took

great care of and enjoyed driving whenever she could. To be honest, Pat was a bit of a "petrol head" and was always, especially in the summer, outside polishing and also checking the Saab for any problems. This extended to sorting out issues with doors, windows and other things house and garden related. Pat did not like to be thought of as a helpless woman, which she most certainly wasn't.

Pat was an integral part of the village and was a member of a number of small close knit social groups. She played cards and went out regularly for meals with her close friends and took part in both the Science and History clubs. She was one of the most positive people to be around.

Unfortunately, Pat was diagnosed with cancer in July 2023, but despite this she still remained incredibly positive and was able to raise a smile when visited. She was admitted to hospital after Christmas and sadly died at the beginning of this year. Rest in Peace Pat we all will miss you very much.



ELECTRICITY BILLING ISSUES?

Do you remember when your electricity bill consisted of one piece of A5 size paper showing simply the number of units consumed (as the difference between meter reading 3 months ago and meter reading now) times the cost per unit plus standing daily charge and VAT? We may have grumbled about it but we went to the Post Office, paid it and forgot about it until the next 3 months had gone by.



Nowadays it seems to be far more complicated. I have recently become aware of some bizarre modern billing examples such as:

- 1. Obvious mistakes on the bill. On the phone "customer services" insist the bill is correct. Then months later the customer received an out of sequence bill demanding an extra payment.
- 2. Bills that the customer found incomprehensible e.g. 4 sides of A4 full of extensive calculations and "reversed amounts".
- 3. Billing comprising 48 pages of A4 paper, including 51 sides with calculations or totals, some calculations incomprehensible to the customer, in a 16 month period. (NB: the amount of paper is an environmental issue but my point here is different should a customer have to wade through pages of calculations, whether on paper or online, just to understand their bill!)
- 4. Perhaps most bizarre and concerning, a phone call received by a customer: "we won't contact you about fitting a 'smart meter' for 6 months if you now state your name and address and we record you doing so". (The customer did check this was their electricity supplier not a random scammer). This despite the customer having repeatedly told the supplier both verbally and in writing that they do not want a 'smart meter'.
- 5. A customer made a complaint but the supplier simply pretended there was no complaint ongoing.

I am interested to know how common these kinds of nonsense are. Amongst the Clarion readers, who is happy or unhappy with their supplier? If you are happy then please tell me, perhaps you can help a fellow villager who is unhappy, they can swap supplier. If you are unhappy, why? Ask yourself: would a 'reasonable person' regard the matter as 'unsatisfactory'?

The focus of this survey is upon billing behaviour and customer services NOT about the CAP or the amount of electricity you use. Please note I DO NOT OFFER ADVICE.

All comments must be accompanied by name and address. This is deliberately NOT an online survey. It is far too easy to type a few unthinking comments onto a website. For this survey your comments will require some effort and motivation to write them and walk round to put them through my letterbox. Do NOT supply copies of bills or emails or online screens or account numbers at this stage. A paragraph stating your views, the name of your supplier and your name and address is all that is required. If your comments are positive then please say whether or not I can put you in touch with someone who is unhappy (and vica versa).

As stated above my principal hope is that your positive comments will benefit others. Regarding negative comments, what happens next depends upon the response. Are the above one-off errors or are they commonplace?

You may know I am a member of Adstock Parish Council but this is entirely a personal initiative, it is not a Parish Council initiative. Please note I am not a member of any political party, nor am I a reporter, nor do I work for a consumer organization, nor do I work in the electricity supply industry. I am a blank canvas. I think that deals with it!

Finally, this is only about electricity. I realise this will include electricity / gas duel billing but please, no gas only billing (if you have a separate supplier).

Let me have any comments within 10 calendar days of this Clarion publication. I will feedback in the next issue and I will not state who receives their electricity from which supplier. Your comments will be retained only for as long as this remains potentially or actually a live issue. When that is no longer the case I will shred them.

CLUB NEWS



THE ADSTOCK HISTORY CLUB

It seems a long time since the Adstock History Club enjoyed their Christmas celebration, kindly hosted by Mark and Beth Baker. We are now well into 2024, and on 17th January, Rob Beadel gave us a very interesting talk, entitled *Pericles and Cleon: Clash of Political Ideologies.* This was the second talk on the subject given by Rob. On this occasion the subject was the relationship between the Athenian politicians Pericles and Cleon.

Cleon and Pericles were two prominent figures in ancient Athens during the 5th century BCE. They personified contrasting political ideologies and leadership styles. Their rivalry not only shaped the course of Athenian history but also highlighted the tension between democratic principles and authoritarian tendencies in the city-state.

The relatively early death of Pericles left Cleon free to exert his influence upon the people of Athens. Cleon was a persuasive speaker and he became known as a populist. His aggressive rhetoric and confrontational approach produced a devoted following among the lower classes. However, his disregard for the rights of his opponents and his tendency to manipulate public sentiment led to accusations of demagoguery. Cleon's influence was helped greatly by his achievement of participating in the capture of many Spartan warriors at Pylos. This was a first in the classical words at the time.

The rivalry between these two politicians serves as a reminder of the interplay between leadership styles, political ideologies, and dynamics of power in ancient Athens. Indeed, some would say that the rise in populism today is not dissimilar to these events so long ago. We look forward to Rob's next talk.

Then Will & Ella sign their father up to an online dating app and


chaos arrives in the form of the gifts from "The Twelve Days of Christmas" sent by a Ms. Truelove.



January 2024's Science Club talk was given by PhD student Madara Mudiyanselage from Buckingham University and was mainly about addressing the Global Warming and Net Zero transition employing "Digital Twins".

A "Digital Twin" is a virtual representation of an object or system that spans its lifecycle, is updated from real-time data, and uses simulation, machine learning, and reasoning to help decision making. It's a virtual model designed to accurately reflect a physical object. The object being studied is outfitted with various sensors related to vital areas of functionality. These sensors produce data about different aspects of the physical object's performance, such as energy output, temperature, weather conditions, and more. This data is then relayed to a processing system and applied to the digital copy.

Once informed with such data, the virtual model can be used to run simulations, study performance issues, and generate possible improvements, all with the goal of generating valuable insights—which can then be applied back to the original physical object.



OK, so now you know.

One of the first Digital Twins that was created was evidently by NASA during the Apollo 13 emergency where an explosion ruptured oxygen tank number two in the service module.

Engineers at NASA and their partners were able to construct a Digital Twin of the spacecraft and were then able to try out a number of potential solutions virtually before trying them out on a spare backup Apollo module after which they instructed the astronauts what to do to save them and what was left of the mission. Madara then focussed on one particular example of using this technology, in designing and constructing virtual towns and cities using information provided by town/city planning and other departments and services to build a realistic Twin of the location which included complete buildings, streets,

lighting, drainage and sewage, weather and atmospheric conditions, population and traffic data etc. The planners could then use the Digital Twin to see what effects adding, removing or changing one particular aspect of the environment would have on the overall situation

Digital Twins are also being used to evaluate how introducing wind or solar farms may affect global warming. This is obviously a very powerful tool and much of the software used is in fact free, such as QGIS a free and Open Source Geographic Information System; Unreal Engine and Blender which are 3D computer graphics tools used for creating animated films, visual effects and photo real visuals and much more. Some of you may already have come across some of these programs.
